

Many contracts hold fast to the Force Majeure clause (French for "superior force"), which is a contract provision that allows a party to suspend or terminate the performance of its obligations when certain circumstances beyond their control arise, making performance inadvisable, commercially impracticable, illegal, or impossible. This means artists may not get paid for the duration of this virus.

This is where the Coalition for African Americans in the Performing Arts (CAAPA)'s Co-Founder Pamela Simonson has taken the initiative to institute the Coronavirus Artist Relief Fund. Artists and musicians directly affected will be able to apply to receive supplemental financial assistance. Artists may request a Coronavirus Artist Relief Fund check by sending their name and email to info@4caapa.org. They will receive instructions to receive money. However, we cannot facilitate the process without YOUR DONATION! As a concerned supporter of the Arts, please donate today and help spread the word! Thank you very much.

Coronorvirus impacts MasterClass Series™ sessions as CAAPA receives \$15K grant from the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA).


When Chairman Mary Anne Carter announced that arts organizations in every state in the nation, as well as the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico, would receive federal funding for arts projects from the NEA in this round of fiscal year 2020 funding, no one could have predicted that a pandemic would affect programs throughout the nation. Overall, 1,187 grants totaling \$27.3 million will provide




Americans opportunities for arts participation including Prince George's County, Maryland's Coalition for African Americans in the Performing Arts (CAAPA), who is among the award recipients for the national Master-

Class Series, which began in Black History

Month and extended thru April. The sessions, which target partnerships with **Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU's)** have now been greatly impacted due to the coronavirus.

Angela Reneé Simpson also a soprano is taking steps to reschedule all of the sessions during the fall semester with Executive Director **Terri Allen** describing the sessions as "informances" (informational per-



formances) enhancing classically trained voices, acting, diction, repertoire, presentation, and movement for aspiring singers, while supporting young and developing professional careers in opera, recitals, and the concert stage, as well as the audition process.



"Master Classes made a huge difference in my vocal development", Co-Founder Pamela Simonson stated while talking about her own experience as an aspiring soprano who attended master classes and as an undergraduate and graduate student. She understands the importance of how master classes

can positively influence a music student's career. In fact, coordinator Simpson also facilitated the very first Master Class Simonson participated in at her high school years ago. Simpson's efforts in collaborating with HBCU's have successfully partnered with Howard University, Morgan State Univ., Morehouse College, Clark-Atlanta Univ., Texas Southern Univ., Spelman College, Livingstone College, Winston-Salem Univ., Jackson State Univ., Hampton Univ., Norfolk State Univ., Virginia State Univ., Xavier College, Tougaloo College, Univ. of Kentucky, Fisk University, Lane College, and more.

For the past several years CAAPA has been a proud partner with the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH) to help highlight their mission of promoting researching, preserving, interpreting, and disseminating information about Black life, history, and culture to the global community. CAAPA has interpreted annual ASALH themes through musical concerts, panels, and events. The first year we presented Black & Brave: Music in Times of War Concert; followed by Music and the Great Migration events; and Music and the Black Vote Series. Next year's ASALH theme is the Black Family. CAAPA is focusing on "Generations: Music & The Black Family", which will touch on how music influenced, impacted and was passed down throughout the generations from 1619 to the present day. 2021 CAAPA events include panel, concerts, recital, poetry event, and family fair.
